

Professor Che Chi-ming 支志明 graduated with BSc at HKU in 1978 and later PhD in 1982.

rofessor Che would be the first to admit he lives and breathes research.

"Research is like food to me," he confessed. "It is a part of my life and where my interest lies."

And his passion towards research is well known among colleagues and students. His former teacher remarked that Professor Che has only one hobby research. Whatever day is it, even the first day of Chinese New Year, if anyone wants to find Professor Che, they should look in the laboratory first.

His devotion and perseverance for research has reached the attention of the highest echelons of national scientists and earned him yet another major recognition.

This February, Professor Che became the first scientist from Hong Kong to receive the First Class Prize of the State Natural Science Award (SNSA) for 2006, the most prestigious award in natural science conferred by the Central Government.

Past recipients of the First Class Prize include mathematician Hua Luo-geng, nuclear physics scientist Wang Ganchang and Tsien Hsue-Shen, the "father of China's ballistic missile force". Professor Che also won the Third Class Prize in 1993.

Professor Che has enjoyed many firsts throughout his career. When he was made Chair Professor of

Chemistry in 1992, he was the youngest academic to hold a Chair Professorship at HKU. In 1995, at the age of just 38, he was elected to the Chinese Academy of Sciences and was the youngest academician, and the first Hong Kong scientist, to be so honoured at the time.

A Home-grown Scientist

"Many people may think that a scientist will only be rewarded with acclaim and wealth by working in other countries, but I do not think so," he said. He himself is a testimony to the statement.


Professor Che was born and raised in Hong Kong, and came from a humble background. His secondary school years were spent at lesser-known schools which he changed often.

He completed his BSc at HKU and while he was studying for his PhD in chemistry his teacher Professor Poon Chung-kwong 潘宗光 (BSc 1963; BSc(Sp) 1964), who is now President of Hong Kong Polytechnic University, recommended that he study research under the supervision of Professor Harry B Gray at the California Institute of Technology. This he did from 1980 to 1983, after which he returned to his alma mater and became a lecturer in chemistry.

Since 1990, Professor Che has been invited by many internationally renowned universities to join their research teams but he decided to stay in Hong Kong and at HKU. "As a Chinese society, Hong Kong provides a stable environment for me to fully dedicate myself to research work."

SNSA First Class Prize

國家自然科學獎一等獎

Established by the State Council in 1979, the State Natural Science Awards are granted to citizens who have made significant scientific discoveries.

The State Natural Science Award is the highest award in natural sciences and is universally respected. The assessment process is highly rigorous, so much so that in 2004 and 2005 no awards were bestowed.

Renowned scientists and academics who have previously won the First Class Prize include:

- Tsien Hsue-Shen 錢學森, "Father of China's ballistic missile force" (1956)

Basic Research Matters

Engaging in basic research, Professor Che finds pure joy in breaking new ground. "For me, a happy moment is when you are able to explain some chemical reactions, or when you are able to control them."

Scientific research, for him, has a sort of purity about it and is not for monetary returns or personal reputation. "Scientific research does not carry an element of financial gain, and if you do it for personal glory I suspect you may end up being sadly disappointed."

Unlike applied research, basic research carries no guarantee of short-term practical gains and its value is often overlooked. However, Professor Che strongly believes that basic research is the cornerstone of a country's econom ic progress and future development.

Speaking to Interflow, the University magazine, back in 1998 (Issue 79, p.42-3), he said: "Everyone knows that the process from basic to applied science is a long one but perhaps people didn't realise that applied science comes from basic science. If there is no basic science. there can be no applied science that is my belief."

Basic research projects are also harder to explain to laymen or obtain research funding. Professor Che's

major research areas are inorganic and organometallic chemistry and photochemistry, and he was awarded the SNSA for his project on "reactive metal-ligand multiple bonded complexes" (金屬配合物中多重鍵的反應性研究). None of these are easily comprehensible for non-scientists.

Put simply, one aspect of Professor Che's research is to seek ways to improve chemical processes, which currently create many undesirable environmental pollution problems, by mastering the technology of metal-catalysts and developing "green chemistry".

Passing the Torch

While some distinguished researchers in overseas universities or research centres focus on research alone, Professor Che, like other academic staff at HKU, assumes the dual role of a researcher and a teacher.

This system allows students to be exposed to cuttingedge research and scholarship which, it is hoped, will inspire them to become researchers themselves. And, in turn, the curiosity and probing questions of these young minds may stimulate academic researchers. Professor Che admits that, with his young colleagues as his driving force, he dare not slow down. "At HKU, we have young and distinguished scientists in the Department of Chemistry, and I am deeply impressed by their dedication as well as determination to pursue scientific research based on invention and originality."

While Professor Che has been inspired by his former teacher-researchers, he has also trained many young chemists and nearly 80 PhD students during the past 23 years.

Among his students are Professor Vivian Yam 任詠華 (BSc 1985; PhD 1988), Chair of Chemistry at HKU, who won the Second Class Prize of the State Natural Science Award in 2005, and Professor Wong Kwok-yin 黃國賢 (BSc 1981; PhD 1986), Chair Professor of Chemical Technology and Head of the Department of Applied Biology and Chemical Technology at Hong Kong Polytechnic University.

Striving Higher

Is there a limit to what Hong Kong scientists can achieve? Not according to Professor Che who is confident that first-class research can be done in

Hong Kong. "In fact, what I have achieved in research is comparable to the work of distinguished scientists around the world."

Professor Che will deliver the 17th Seaborg Lectures at the University of California, Berkeley on April 20 and 27. He is the first Asian to receive the prestigious Seaborg Lectureship, which was launched in 1991 in honour of Dr Glenn T Seaborg, Nobel Laureate of Chemistry in 1951, also former chancellor of the University of California, Berkeley and chairman of the US Atomic Energy Commission under US presidents Kennedy, Johnson and Nixon.

With such an impressive track record at the young age of 49, Professor Che has the potential to achieve more breakthroughs in the scientific frontiers and advance human knowledge in the molecular world. And perhaps he will achieve another first for Hong Kong and HKU.



Election of Members to the Standing Committee

Nominations are hereby invited for the election of eight members to the Standing Committee at the coming Ordinary General Meeting on June 28, 2007 to fill the vacancies arising from:

The elected members will serve on the Committee for a term of three years until the Ordinary General Meeting in 2010.

According to Paragraphs 26 and 28 of the Convocation Constitution, a person is eligible to be nominated for the election if he/she has been a member of Convocation for two years, and a retiring member is eligible for re-election.

Nomination Procedures

Paragraph 40 of the Convocation Rules requires that: A candidate must be nominated in writing by at least ten members entitled to vote.

Nomination form can be downloaded from **www.hku.hk/convocat/election/2007** or obtained from the Secretariat, c/o Development & Alumni Affairs Office, The University of Hong Kong (Tel: 2859 7064). All nominations shall be accompanied by a statement by the candidate that he/she is willing to stand for election.

Each candidate is also requested to attach with the nominations a brief biography of himself/herself, in English, of not more than 200 words and a copy of his/her photograph to be published in the Notice of the Ordinary General Meeting, the websites of Convocation and electronic voting.

Nominations should reach the Clerk of Convocation, c/o Development & Alumni Affairs Office, Rm 738, Knowles Building, The University of Hong Kong before 5 pm April 30, 2007. Fax is not a valid mode of delivery of nominations to the Clerk.

Validity of Nomination Forms

All nomination forms, whether original or photocopied, shall be clearly completed with the required information and signed by the nominators.

Paragraph 25(b) of the Convocation Constitution prohibits the Standing Committee from having more than four members who are also officers, teachers or staff of the University or who are also in receipt of any salary or stipend thereform except individuals occasionally appointed to ad hoc professional contracts. Since paragraph 25(b) of the Convocation Constitution already catches more than four of the current members of the Standing Committee, it is not possible for the Convocation to elect any candidate who is an officer, teacher or staff member of the University or who is in receipt of any salary or stipend thereform except where he/she is only occasionally appointed to ad hoc professional contract(s). Accordingly, nominations of such candidates will be invalid.





Half a Century of Publishing

Below is a review of the Hong Kong University Press' development by Dr Colin Day, Publisher of HKU Press:

The Press was formally established in 1956 and so the 50th Anniversary of the Press comes in the academic year 2006-2007.

What we believe to be the first publication bearing the name Hong Kong University Press was more of a pamphlet than a book, a catalogue of an exhibition of Chinese Tomb Pottery Figures. During those informal years, the nine publications ranged extremely widely from chemistry

to architecture, and that very first title was bilingual, titled in Chinese 明器圖錄. From its beginning, the Press has published in both Chinese and English.

Henri Vetch, the first publisher, was by all accounts a character and a difficult man. He arrived fresh from incarceration in Beijing as a suspected spy. But it was his long experience as a bookseller and publisher in Beijing that equipped him to lead the Press from its beginning until his retirement in 1968. It was during the ensuing interregnum that, in 1969, the Press published perhaps the most

important work in its history: James Legge's great *Chinese Classics* with a *Translation*, *Critical and Exegetical Notes*, *Prolegomena and Copious Indexes* – a title of a length appropriate for the five volumes.

In 1970, Geoffrey Bonsall, then Deputy Librarian at the University, was asked to take the helm at the Press. He did so with skill and panache for 10 years and still is actively involved with publishing in Hong Kong. It was at the very end of his period that the Press moved off campus to Béthanie. In the new location, C W (Ken) Toogood took over in 1980 as Publisher. He joined the Press from Oxford University Press. In turn, his successor, Leon Comber, came from Heinemann in 1986. Oxford then again supplied the next Publisher, Barbara Clarke, who served from 1991 to 1999. It was in her time, in 1997, that the Press moved out of Béthanie to the Hing Wai Centre. From 2000 on, it has been my privilege to be Publisher and see the Press grow and grow stronger.

During those years the Press steadily increased its output of titles, while maintaining the quality of its publications and sustaining the considerable breadth of its list. The total number of books published has now just passed the 700 mark. They represent an impressive contribution to the world of scholarship and mark the effective way that the name of The University of Hong Kong has been disseminated around the world in conjunction with significant academic work over the past fifty years.



MBBS Class of 1966 - then and now

Reunions are moments of deep reflection, when you can count your blessings, and contemplate life and your goals Reunions date back to the earliest years of schools and universities. Initially, graduates returned to their schools or universities just to visit professors and friends. Then they lingered on and stayed for dinners or banquets. Over the years, for some universities, reunions have developed into elaborate festivals that can last for a week, with talks, concerts, tours, and so forth. Reunions come to be milestones in the collective life of a class and of individual classmates.

Reunions give alumni a chance to nostalgically reminisce about their old school days, fondly remember their youthful pranks, and bring each other

up to date on what has happened to each of them since they went their separate ways. Above all, reunions offer opportunities for us to glimpse at who we were and who we are today.

Reunions say as much about the future as they do about the past.

Reflections of the Past

"For one thing is certain as we grow older: The few people who have truly passed through us and us through them, until the dreams, images, memories are past sorting out, these people become precious links to our continuity... If we try to bury the images of others who meant so much, past of us dies with them. How much greater our aliveness if we can come to a freestanding friendship with those who have shared us."

Gail Sheehy, from her book Passages

eunions bring together people who shared experiences which were socially and psychologically significant in their lives; experiences which continue to have an impact on them in the present.

The reunion acknowledges the importance of those past experiences and gives substance to the past by presenting an opportunity to connect with one another, and to reminisce and reinforce memories with those of others who shared those experiences.

However, attending a reunion involves more than reminiscence. Reunions are unique occasions; they say what who has done and who they are now, how successful they are in the present and how that measures up to their past expectations.

Each reunion builds on a community that existed in the past to which returnees seek to return to in the present. By connecting new events with old ones, the new events become part of tradition and past experiences, and build continuity with the past.

And while the community built during the one night of a reunion is fragile and limited, reunions ultimately draw people closer to each other.

Global Fervour for Reunions

Graduates of universities worldwide have developed vibrant and diverse traditions for reunions over the years

Reunion Weekend

In North America, reunions are celebrated with robust conventions and festivities which bring thousands of alumni and families from near and far. While most of these annual festivals will stretch over a weekend, some can last as long as a week and include local tours and other entertainment. The more formal reunions occur every five years, although alumni who have not ventured far from their alma mater may attend class reunions every year.

Apart from talks, dinners, concerts, tours, the reunion programme often includes a memorial service for members of the class who have passed away. The service typically

includes music, readings and a reading of the names of class members who have passed away and are often held with the loved ones of the deceased in attendance. If a memorial service is not held, the names of the departed class members may receive recognition in the reunion's programme.

Reunion Gifts

In the year leading up to the reunion, classmates also organise a reunion campaign to generate a special gift for the future development of their alma mater. This tradition of reunionrelated giving dates back more than a century for some US universities, such as Harvard and Yale.

P-rade in Style

The climax of class reunions at Princeton is the P-rade, or the annual procession of classes, which is replete with elaborate costumes, marching bands and exotic floats. Even the most senior alumni get to join the procession by riding along in golf carts. This tradition harks back to 1906 when the reunion planners asked alumni to march in procession on their way to watch the annual Princeton-Yale baseball game.

Highlanders, bellhops, sailors, Roman gladiators, convicts, pirates, a deck of cards are just a few of the costumes Princeton alumni have donned over the years. And occasionally, live animals have joined the procession: a

troupe of trained lions in 1906, a pair of tigers in 1923, and three elephants in 1949. Now, more than 9,000 alumni and relatives join the three-hour P-rade each year.

A Survival Guide for Reunions

Some useful advice from reunion experts around the world on how to survive (and enjoy!) your class reunion

Plan an eventful reunion programme


Talks and forums, sports events (tennis, hiking, swimming, football and golf), dinners, parties, concerts, dancing, overseas tours. etc.

riennial Intervarsity Games (TIG), a sports competition among four universities, was developed from a sport foray in 1949, when Sir Lindsay Ride, the then Vice-Chancellor of The University of Hong Kong, led a contingent of HKU sportsmen to Singapore to compete in cricket and tennis matches. Since then, it has developed to almost Olympic scale with more and

more universities joining in and has become a major triennial intervarsity sports event in South-East Asia.

Unfortunately, the Games had been interrupted by the Asian financial crisis in 1997 and for the ensuring years. Then last year, a group of students, from the Sports Council of HKU Students' Union, formed the TIG Organising Committee and determined to revive the TIG and its spirit.

Celebrate a Century's Grace, Go Forward in Faith

n 2006, St Stephen's Girls' College (SSGC) celebrated 100 years of providing quality education to young women. Combined with a fundraising campaign for school development, the centenary celebration included a miniwalkathon, a fundraising bazaar, Centenary Concerts, Open Days and the Centenary Dinner.

SSGC has strong ties with The University of Hong Kong stretching back to its earliest founding years. When the University was founded in 1911, Winifred Carden, Headmistress of SSGC, wrote almost immediately to request that girls be admitted as students. This historical suggestion came to be ratified in 1921, and four SSGC

graduates were among the first ten women admitted to the University. They were: Chan Ying 陳英 (Medical) Tso Shuk-ki 曹淑姬 (Medical), Ng Sui-ha 吳瑞霞 (Arts) Tsang Ting-chien 曾廷千 (Engineering).

To provide accommodation for early women students at HKU, St Stephen's Hall was established, first on Babington Path and later on Lyttelton Road. St Stephen's Hall later merged with St John's Hall to become St John's College of today.

far, he has managed to visit nearly half of the sites. Here he is in Bhutan, a haven of peace, last November.



Liu Ching-chih 劉靖之 (MPhil 1979; PhD 1983)

Since December 2003, Professor Liu has undertaken an extensive revision of his monumental work,《中國新音樂史論》(A Critical History of New Music in China), which was first published in 1998. He is now working on the final touches of the revised version. In July 2006, Ms Caroline Mason, an English sinologist, completed an English translation of the book, which will help to provide a different perspective on westernised Chinese music for English-speaking musicologists and sinologists. A simplified character edition will be published in China this year and a traditional character edition will be published in Hong Kong later in the year.

In 2005, Professor Liu donated his exceptional collection of scores, books, manuscripts, audiovisual materials and journals on new music in China to The University of Hong Kong Libraries. The collection, located in Music Library, provides a great opportunity for music researchers in Hong Kong as well as from overseas to understand China's musical past from 1885 to the present day.



For some HKU Arts alumni, a reunion of sorts took place on the last two days of 2006 when they took to the boards again with the Seals Players.

Seals Players was famed for introducing many western plays in translation onto the Hong Kong stage, producing over 60 productions from the 1970s to 1990s. Many HKU alumni were founding members of the Players and joined its recent revival of two performances of Chekov's *Three Sisters* at City Hall.

Vicki Ooi, its Artistic Director, and Jane Lai, its most prominent translator, both taught at the Department of English and inspired a whole generation of HKU graduates who went on to make their own contributions to the local theatre scene. Ambrose So was one of the founders of the Jiazi Society of Calligraphy (甲子書學會) in 1985 and has been its president since then. His works have been selected for numerous exhibitions including the Contemporary Hong Kong Art Biennial Exhibition and he was invited to hold personal exhibitions at HKU and the Macau Museum. His works are in the collections of the University Museum and Art Gallery, HKU, the Macau Museum, Hunan Museum and the Art Gallery of the Princeton University. In 2000, Ambrose was invited to be one of the inscribers of the Macau stamps series titled Macau Art-Chinese Calligraphy, issued by the Macau Post Office and Telecommunications.

Jiazi Society of Calligraphy was formed by a group of teachers and students of HKU Extra-Mural studies (now SPACE) including Jat See-yeu 翟仕堯、Ip Hoi 葉愷 and Ma Yun-hein 馬潤憲. And Professor Jao Tsung-i 饒宗頤 is the honorary adviser of the Society. It was so named "Jiazi" because, in the Chinese calendar, the year 1985 was "Jiazi" (甲子年).

IN MEMORIAM



Irene Cheng 何崎姿(又名何艾苓) (BA 1925)

The first Hong Kong-born woman graduate of HKU

rene Cheng, née Ho Tung, passed away on February 17, 2006 at her home in San Diego, California. She was 102.

Born in 1904 into a privileged family in Hong Kong, Dr Cheng could have chosen any life path. Yet, encouraged by her parents Sir Robert Ho Tung 何東 and Lady Clara Ho Tung, she chose to dedicate herself to the field of education, becoming something of a pioneer in the process. In 1921 The University of Hong Kong began to admit women students and Dr Cheng was one of the first through the doors. She became the first Hong Kong-born woman to graduate from HKU, which she did in 1925 with a degree in English.

After furthering her studies at Columbia University, New York, and London University, Dr Cheng headed to Guangzhou where she taught at Lingnan University. In the 1930s, she married a Beijing engineer but the marriage was short-lived. Her husband, Cheng Hsiang-hsien, fell ill and died less than two years after their wedding, leaving Dr Cheng to bring up their daughter, June, alone.

After the war, she returned to Hong Kong and to her first love, education. She became the highest-ranking Chinese women in the Education Department and later, on her retirement from government, was principal of the Confucian Tai Shing School in Wong Tai Sin. For her services to education in Hong Kong, she was appointed an Officer of the Order of the British Empire (OBE) by Queen Elizabeth II in 1961.

To be close to her daughter and subsequent grandchildren, Dr Cheng moved to San Diego, California in 1968. It was here that she founded the Chung Hwa School of San Diego to teach Chinese language and culture to young people.

She spent some of her final years writing two books. In Clara Ho Tung: A Hong Kong Lady, Her Family and Her Times, Dr Cheng commemorates her mother, whom she credits with as being an inspirational influence in her life and for imbuing in her a passion for education and learning. Her own fascinating life and experiences are in her autobiography, Intercultural Reminiscences.



Dr Henry Fok Ying-tung 霍英東

(HonDSocSc 1995)

r Henry Fok passed away in Beijing on October 28, 2006, at the age of 83. He was Vice Chairman of the Standing Committee of the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference National

Committee. The national flag was draped over his coffin at his funeral; an honour bestowed on only three other people in Hong Kong since the handover.

Dr Fok was one of the earliest supporters of a modern China and to prosperous and stable Hong Kong. He devoted much effort to the Mainland's development and the opening up of its economy, in conjunction with Hong Kong's industrial development.

In his quest to advance China and Hong Kong, he took up a number of important positions, including member of the Basic Law Drafting Committee, Advisor on Hong Kong Affairs and Vice Chairman of the Preparatory Committee of the HKSAR.

A great passion of Dr Fok was his charitable and community work and he set up the Fok Ying Tung

Foundation to support various programmes, particularly in health care, science, culture, and sports. At HKU, the swimming pool at Sandy Bay proudly bears his name. And the Fok Ying Tung Foundation has been an Honorary Patron of the HKU Foundation since 2003.

Dr Fok also supported education and the advancement of research, which is evidenced through his support of the construction of the Graduate House and the establishment of the Henry Fok Professorship in Infectious Diseases, inaugurated in 2005, of which he said:

"For as surely as the rewards of medical research are the reaffirmation and celebration of life itself, the pursuit and advancement of scholarship in this realm must be supported at the highest levels."



Dr John Richard Choa (BArch 1957; HonDSocSc 2003)

r John Choa passed away peacefully on February 8, 2007, at the age of 75.

Dr Choa's distinguished career in architecture began upon his university graduation. His early years as an architect were spent in England where he specialised in the design, detailing and administration of university and hospital capital projects. Today, many buildings at the Universities of Durham, Reading and London, and hospitals in Cambridge, stand as enduring monuments of his early masterworks.

In Hong Kong, many will remember Dr Choa for his contributions to large residential estate developments in the 1970s, many of which, notably

Mei Foo Sun Chuen and Taikoo Shing, continue to represent models of progressive urban planning.

A look around the University's campus today will reveal that he has left his mark here as well, like the Flora Ho Sports Centre. He was also a staunch supporter of the University's activities. Dr Choa was a member of Court from 1979 to 1991, of Council from 1994 to 2003, and enthusiastically took part in much committee work. At the same time he remained a respected member of the Executive Committee of the Hong Kong University Alumni Association and the Standing Committee of Convocation.



Yeung Kai-yin 楊啟彥 (BA 1962)

ormer top government official Yeung Kai-yin passed away on February 9, 2007 at the age of 65.

After joining the government in 1962, Mr Yeung took up 22 various posts during his 31 years with the civil service. He was appointed Secretary for Education and Manpower in 1989 and two years later he was the first Chinese person to be appointed Secretary for the Treasury. His last position was Secretary for Transport, a post he held until retiring from government in 1993.

Mr Yeung was Chief Executive of the Kowloon-Canton Railway Corporation from 1996 to 2003 and Chairman till the appointment of Michael Tien in 2001. He was also named Chairman of Vocational Training Council in 1998.



Professor Samuel Yen 閰守之 (MBBS 1954; HonDSc 1980)

Professor Samuel Yen, a pioneer and a legend in the field of reproductive endocrinology, professor emeritus and former chair of the Department of Reproductive Medicine at the University of California, San Diego (UCSD) School of Medicine, passed away in La Jolla, California on December 26, 2007. He was 79 years old.


Born into a medical family in Beijing, Professor Yen was accepted into Chee-Loo University as a pre-med student. He continued his education at HKU, followed by residencies at Queen Mary Hospital and Tsan Yuk Hospital. He completed his residency at Johns Hopkins

Hospital and undertook a fellowship at Harvard Medical School.

In 1970 he was recruited by UCSD, where he was Chair of the Department of Reproductive Medicine, Chief of the Division of Reproductive Endocrinology, and holder of the WR Persons Endowed Chair in Reproductive Medicine. He retired from UCSD in 2000. His book on Reproductive Endocrinology is a classic text read by all in the field.

Professor Yen was the first Aw Boon Haw Visiting Professor at the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, HKU, in 1979 and trained many endocrinologists, including Professor Christina Wang, Dr David Anderson and Professor Grace Tang.

His many awards and honours include the Rhône-Poulenc Rorer Clinical Investigator Award by the Endocrine Society, the Distinguished Achievement Award by the American Fertility Society, and the Simpson Medal by the University of Edinburgh.



Professor Peter Lisowski

(Emeritus Professor since 1984)

Professor Peter Lisowski passed away peacefully in Tasmania on January 11, 2007 at the age of 85.

Professor Lisowski was Chair of Anatomy and Head of the Department of Anatomy from 1969 to 1983, and had been Emeritus Professor since 1984. He introduced the teaching of radiological anatomy and played a leading role in setting up an anatomy course for dental students in 1982.

His department was one of the first to receive Mainland academics for training when China introduced its "Open Door" policy towards the end of the 1970s.

After retiring from HKU, he took up a part-time teaching position with the Department of Anatomy at the University of Tasmania. Professor Lisowski remained active after his retirement proper in 2000, publishing several books – including a new edition of his anatomy book, which was released just a few days after his death.



Dr Yu Chiu-kwong 余朝光 (MBBS 1929)

r Yu Chiu-kwong passed away peacefully on November 25, 2006.

Dr Yu graduated in 1929 with an MBBS and went on to serve with distinction as a doctor for the underprivileged community of Yau Mau Tei. He also served as the Medical Superintendent of Kwong Wah Hospital during the post-war years.

On his 101st birthday in May 2006, his family created the Yu Chiu Kwong Professorship in Medicine at HKU to honour the qualities of empathy, commitment and humility he demonstrated in serving thousands of patients throughout his career.

The legacy of commitment and compassion of Dr Yu towards his patients also lives on in his four sons—all HKU alumni, all doctors and all Morrisonians.
