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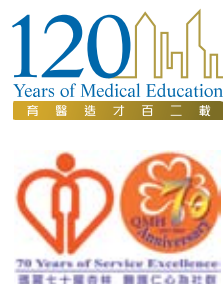

The Anniversary Dinner, held on December 14, 2007 at the Hong Kong Convention and Exhibition Centre, marked the ultimate fete of the Faculty's Celebrations of 120 years of medical education. The event was co-organised by the Queen Mary Hospital, which also celebrated its 70th Anniversary in the same year.



The Dinner's Guest of Honour, The Hon Henry Tang 唐英年, Chief Secretary for Administration of the HKSAR, delivered a speech to kick-start the festive evening. The event was also honoured by the presence of Mr Huang Jie-fu 黃潔夫, Vice-Minister of Health, the People's Republic of China.

Milestones

1887

The Hong Kong College of Medicine for Chinese is formally inaugurated on October 1 with Sir Patrick Manson as its first Dean.

1892

The first two graduates, including Dr Sun Yat-sen, a graduate of the Hong Kong College of Medicine for Chinese.

1912

The University of Hong Kong is formally opened. The Hong Kong College of Medicine is incorporated within the University as its first faculty – the Faculty of Medicine.

1941

Activities of the University are brought to a halt by the Japanese invasion in December until the surrender in August 1945.

1948

The University is officially reopened and new medical undergraduates are admitted again.

1965

Li Shu Fan Building on Sassoon Road for the accommodation of pre-clinical departments is formally opened in April.

1997

The Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery (MBBS) programme is reformed. The Faculty becomes the first medical institute in the region to adopt a system-based curriculum using student-centred and problem-based learning approaches.

The "Long Service Volunteer Award Presentation cum Patient Groups' Gathering" was held immediately before the Anniversary Dinner. The special Guest of Honour, Dr the Hon Donald Tsang 曾蔭權 (Hon LLD 2005), Chief Executive of the HKSAR, presented the awards to 10 hospital volunteers with over 1,500 hours of voluntary service, as well as certificates to 16 patient groups in recognition of their contributions in promoting mutual help and care among patients.



The Medical Class of 1965 won the best support and most attendance prize of the Anniversary Dinner. Dr Stephen Foo Kam-so 傅鑑蘇 accepted the prize on behalf of the Class.



Professor Sir David Todd 達安輝 (MBBS 1952; MD 1958; Hon DSc 1992), who had flown in from Cambridge for the Anniversary Dinner, paid tribute to the predecessors whose achievements had been instrumental in bringing both the Faculty and Queen Mary Hospital to their present international stature.

2002

The Faculty moves into the new complex with 48,250 square metres of well-equipped facilities for medical education and research.

2003

The Department of Microbiology identifies SARS coronavirus as the primary causative agent. Premier Wen Jiabao 溫家寶 visits the Faculty in June.

2005

The State Key Laboratories of Emerging Infectious Diseases and Brain and Cognitive Sciences, the first State Key Laboratories located outside Mainland China, are established.

As the Faculty moves forward to implement the four-year curriculum from 2012, it has identified two core themes to guide future development: social innovation and global citizenship. Social Innovation Internship (SI²) provides students with different types of projects such as corporate social responsibility, social services, political advocacy, public policy analysis, management, marketing, public relations, media and journalism, and tourism and leisure.

Faculty of Dentistry

25th Anniversary

The Faculty of Dentistry celebrated its Silver Jubilee during 2007. This milestone marked 25 years of serving Hong Kong and the region through advancing oral health and well-being, achieved with excellence in learning, discovery, patient care and engagement.

To date, sixty-five per cent of Hong Kong's 1,800 registered dentists are Faculty alumni, and the Faculty has conferred over 1,600 degrees since 1985. The Prince Philip Dental Hospital is still the only dental teaching hospital in Hong Kong.

A Brief History of the Faculty

1980	Dental Studies at HKU admits the first batch of dental and paradental students
1981	The Prince Philip Dental Hospital (PPDH) opens in Sai Ying Pun on Hong Kong Island

2004	The number of BDS graduates exceeds 1,000
2007	25th Anniversary Year

The logo chosen by the Faculty to emphasise its message was an apple, representing 'a healthy bite, healthy mouth and healthy lifestyle'. Coincidentally, the apple is also a Western symbol of learning and knowledge.

The main colours of the logo (red, blue and green) relate to the University shield's colours and the motto echoes the University's pursuit of sustaining and enhancing its excellence "through outstanding teaching and world-class research so as to produce well-rounded graduates with lifelong abilities to provide leadership within the societies they serve".

The Faculty's year-long Silver Jubilee events included two concerts at the Hong Kong Cultural Centre, a gala

dinner, golf tournament, open days, special lectures and workshops, exhibitions, and an international conference on advanced dentistry.

"In a quarter of a century, the Faculty has made its mark on the region and the world. We are the only dental school in China that uses English as the medium of instruction and one of a very few dental schools in the world that fully implements problem-based learning in the undergraduate curriculum. And, our staff and students win major international prizes for their pioneering research," says the Dean, Professor Lakshman Samaranayake. **"Our Silver Jubilee was the perfect occasion to reflect on the past and celebrate our future!"**

Twelve Outstanding Individuals named Honorary Fellows



The University of Hong Kong presented Honorary University Fellowships to twelve distinguished individuals in recognition of their contributions to the University and community. The ceremony was presided over by Dr the Hon David Li Kwok-po 李國寶 (Hon LLD 1996), Pro-Chancellor of the University.



Dr Chan Sui-kau 陳瑞球博士

Dr Chan is a prominent industrialist, philanthropist and ardent supporter of education. He helped to found the China Synergy Programme for Outstanding Youth in 1999. Now in its eighth year, the Programme enables ethnic Chinese students of renowned overseas universities to visit Hong Kong, Macau and the Mainland.



Mr Paul Chow Man-yiu 周文耀先生
(BScEng 1970; DipManStud 1979; MBA 1982)

Mr Chow is the Chief Executive of the Hong Kong Exchanges and Clearing Limited (HKEx) and an ex-officio member of the Board of HKEx. He has made significant contributions to his *alma mater*, especially as a member of the University's Council and Court.



Mr Gallant Ho Yiu-tai 何耀棟先生
(BA 1965)

Mr Ho is the founder of Gallant Y T Ho & Co, a major local law firm. His commitment to education is widely recognised. Besides endowing numerous school scholarships, he has made significant contributions to the establishment of two primary schools, named after his late father Mr Ho Chak-wan.



Professor Norman Ko Wah-man 高華文教授 (BScEng 1963; DSc 1995)

Professor Ko is an expert in fluid dynamics and acoustics, and a pioneer in noise pollution control in Hong Kong. His professional knowledge is well-recognised through his public service. He has been a past member of numerous government environmental committees and is presently Council Chairman and Supervisor of the Chun Tok School.



Mr Lam Sum-chee 林森池先生
(BA 1967)

Mr Lam is an investment guru and one of the first generation of Hong Kong's financial analysts. He established a private trust in 1986 that has since donated scholarships and bursaries to undergraduate arts students. He also pledged to donate his entire private trust to his *alma mater*.



Professor Francis Lau Shiu-kwan 劉紹鈞教授

Professor Lau is one of the leading figures in the real estate and construction industry in Hong Kong. He is dedicated to public service in Hong Kong and the Mainland, having advised various municipal governments in the latter and served on a number of government advisory committees in the former.



Dr Jennie Yee-ching Lee 李梅以菁博士
(Bachelor of Arts)

Dr Lee is a prominent philanthropist and visionary educator. Her tireless devotion to education led her to establish the "Lee Shiu Socio-Economic Study Project" in 1998 to bring together outstanding university students from Hong Kong, China, Singapore and the US with the purpose of cultivating international leaders.



Professor Walton Li Wai-tat 李維達教授

Professor Li is Medical Superintendent and Head of Department of Ophthalmology of the Hong Kong Sanatorium & Hospital, and Honorary Professor of the Eye Institute of HKU. He has made profound contributions to the medical profession and his achievements are well-recognised.



Mrs Anne Marden 馬登夫人

Mrs Marden is dedicated to community service and committed to supporting education. She led the Hong Kong Red Cross in establishing the Princess Alexandra Red Cross Residential School; worked closely with Caritas and the Education Department to set up three Marden Foundation Schools; and since the 1990s has funded Visiting Fellowship at HKU's Faculty of Education.



Mr Shum Choi-sang 岑才生先生

Mr Shum is a prominent figure in Hong Kong journalism and committed to the development and welfare of society. He is Honorary President of the Newspaper Society of Hong Kong and Advisor to the Chinese-Language Press Institute. Mr Shum is currently Chairman of the Overseas Chinese Enterprises Group Ltd. and of Real Connection Ltd.



Dr Vivian Taam Wong 黃譚智媛醫生
(MBBS 1969)

Dr Wong is the Hospital Authority Advisor of Integrative Medicine. She is dedicated to medical education, research and improving public health. Dr Wong has committed herself to public and social services over the past three decades. Her areas of interest include women, children, environment, education, health and Chinese Medicine.



Mr Yeung Pak-sing 楊佰成先生
(BScEng 1973; MScEng 1980)

Mr Yeung is an entrepreneur in the power supply industry and an engineer by profession. He helped found the Hong Kong University Graduates Association (HKUGA) and the charitable HKUGA Education Foundation to promote quality education. The Foundation has established two direct-subsidy schools, one primary, the other secondary.

A Morrisonian Passion to Serve

"We started with a mentoring relationship but ended up as friends!"

These are Ryan Li's 李罕 reflections on his mentorship role over the past 10 months. A Morrisonian from the Mainland, he joined the "Child Mentorship Scheme" organised by the Society for Community Organisation (SoCO) (香港社區組織協會), a not-for-profit organisation.

Last April, a group of Morrison Hall students participated in the mentorship scheme with the aim of providing children in Shamshuipo with opportunities for social exposure and development. Volunteer students were

trained by qualified social workers as mentors and then matched with mentees aged from six to eighteen on a one-to-one basis.

Given the fact that most of the students were first-time mentors, Dr Billy Hau 侯智恆 (BSc 1991; MSc (EnvMan) 1994; PhD 2000), Warden of Morrison Hall, intentionally paired each of the mentors, encouraging peer support. This strategy turned out to be very successful.

The rapport and camaraderie amongst mentors played an important role during the initial stages of the scheme when their relations with mentees occasionally encountered a stumbling block.



"At first, mentees were not willing to express themselves and even rejected communication with us," said Tony Hung 洪敦熹, another student mentor. "We would try different ways to fill the gap, like playing basketball, watching films or offering tutorials. And, our relations improved bit by bit. But, it was not until the summer camp that a breakthrough came about in our relations."



HKU is no longer a stranger to the children of the "Child Mentorship Scheme". It represents a dream that can become reality. The summer camp saw mentees and their families staying at Morrison Hall where they played basketball games, visited the campus and enjoyed their first dinner at HKU.

The two-day overnight summer camp was held last July with the full support of Morrison Hall. Mentees and their family members were invited to stay with student mentors at the Hall where they played, shared and dined together.

Relations have improved to a point where mentors now keep in touch with their mentees regularly by phone, email or face to face.

"We helped to organise the camp so that the mentees would have a chance to visit our University, the Hall, meet people from different backgrounds, and widen their social exposure," said Billy. "And, at the same time, this was a good occasion to introduce the project to other students in the Hall."

Being mentors for almost a year, the students admitted that their communication skills have improved not only with mentees but also with people of different ages.

The scheme provided them with a chance to re-visit their teenage years when they too, like their mentees, also hungered for true friendships and new things.

"We were aware that each family had hidden and non-apparent difficulties which were beyond our ability to handle. These we could only report to the social worker, but as mentors we were able to do much more than we thought possible."

"Simply serving as a role model to these children could be effective," said Alle Tang 鄧國團, the coordinator of the scheme.

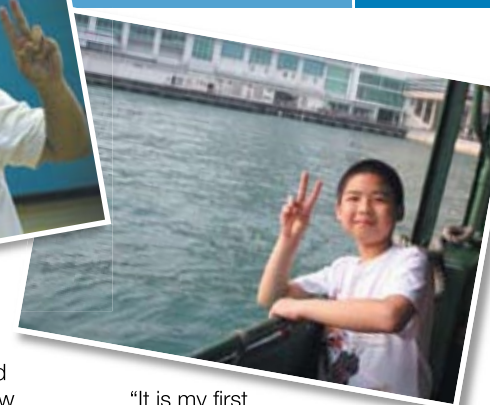

It has now been almost a year since the partnership's inception. As of January 2008, thirty Morrisonians have participated and became mentors, among them four have become alumni during this period.

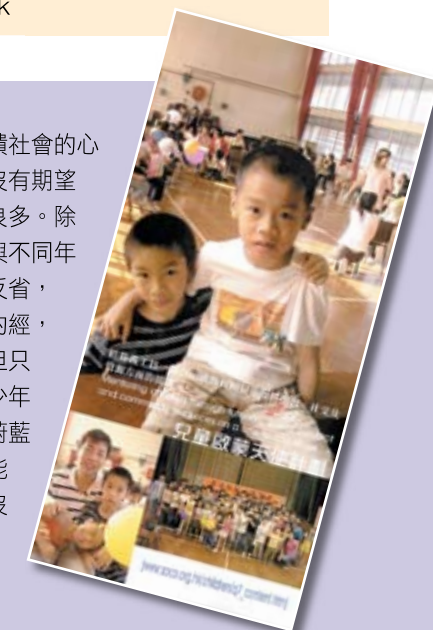

從納米比亞說起.....

從小已經有一個奇妙的心願：我要到非洲去！可能是從相片、影片中，見到非洲人的生活艱苦，希望可以親身接觸他們，體驗他們的生活。

直至二零零四年底，我認識了國際雷利計劃（Raleigh International Hong Kong），讓有志者可以選擇到發展中的國家，例如加納、納米比亞、哥斯達黎加等，與來自世界各地的年輕義工，透過遠足歷奇、社區服務及環保工作貢獻當地，藉此磨練意志，提升個人的團隊精神及領導才能。

經過兩年半的工作安排和籌集旅費，我終於在二零零七年三月廿六日出發，目的地是位於非洲西面的納米比亞Namibia。

Namibia
納米比亞

兩大考驗

廿五歲的我，是五十多個義工中年紀最大的，其餘全部介乎十八至廿歲出頭。他們絕大部份來自英國，就算是來自澳洲、紐西蘭及馬來西亞的，都曾在英國居住或讀書，操流利地道英語。對我來說，言語上的溝通已經是一大考驗。

另一考驗是如何適應非洲人的文化，他們是一個十分熱情友善的民族，笑口常開，即使遇到困難，沒有工作、沒有飯吃，仍是開開心心的。他們生活悠閒、節奏慢，這也就是Africa time，遲到，差不多是一種習慣。如果他們說「快到了」，即還要等大概兩小時；如果說「兩分鐘就到」，即半小時！

學會珍惜

這次我參加了「遠足歷奇」和「社區服務」兩個項目。

「遠足歷奇」的目的地是納米比亞西北部荒野。背著背囊步行240公里，走過河床、高原、荒漠，終於抵達大西洋東岸的Skeleton Coast。超級重的背囊，炎熱的天氣，一邊走，一邊有數十隻烏蠅衝入我的耳朵、眼睛，甚至口腔，沒有沖涼的機會，食物也不多（為減輕背囊的重量）……這三星期給我最大的領悟——學會珍惜。期間我也學會野外求存的知識，例如拾木頭生火煮食、晚上如何防備野生動物襲擊（途中曾有獅子和犀牛出沒）、清晨三時半起身準備出發等。與隊員一齊捱過艱苦旅程，令我對團隊精神有更新的體會。

另一個項目是社區服務。我與另一隊人到納米比亞北部的一個村落重建一間學校。學校原先由樹枝和鐵皮建成，四周沙塵滾滾，學生每日都不穿鞋上學。相比之下，香港的學校簡直是天堂！學生沒有書簿（太貴了！），在沙地上寫字，上學後，還要幫家人放牛羊。



每天，我都會看見一位四至五歲的小朋友，赤腳在攝氏五十度高溫的地上步行，拿著樹枝在帳幕附近放牧，呼喝著比他們體積大數倍的牛羊，這就是他們的生活！最令我心悸動的，是一個身材細小的朋友，還未能站得穩就來走去，我以為他只有兩歲，原來他已五歲了！都是因為缺乏營養之故。



成長練歷

同年，五月十七日，我回到香港。

很多人都在爭取平等、公平，在世界上，原來真的沒有絕對的公平，這是我在旅程中最深刻的體會。當地愛滋病問題嚴重，大概有百分之二十至四十（視乎不同地區）的母親是愛滋病帶菌者。在某些落後地區，村民篤信巫醫，竟然還有巫醫指示男性愛滋病帶菌者與處女性交，詛稱這樣便可得治！當地失業率大約有百分之四十，他們得不到政府的任何支援。雖然困難重重，不幸的納米比亞人仍然笑瞇瞇度日，可能，這就是在艱苦環境下孕育出來的智慧。

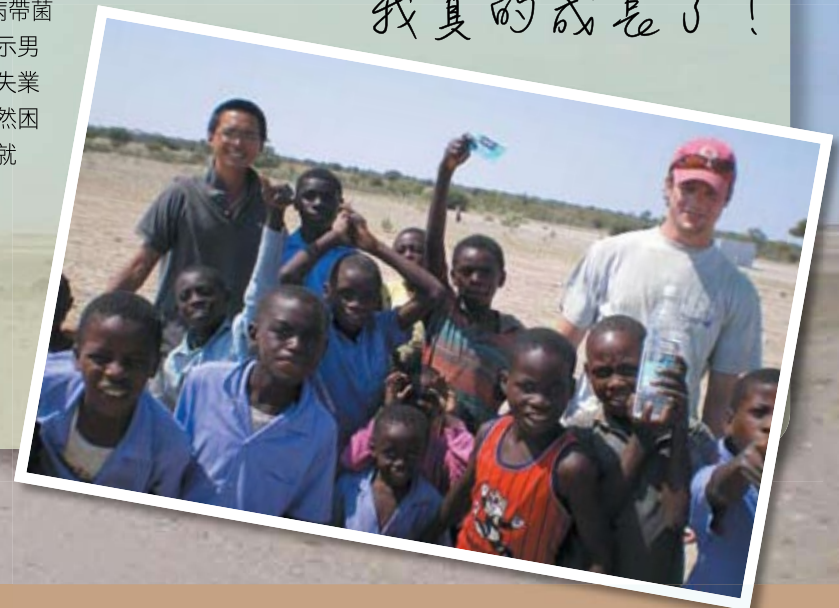

An Urban Oasis of Greenery and Learning

Imagine if you will the University of Hong Kong as garden. This is what Professor Jim Chi-yung 詹志勇 (BA 1975), Chair Professor of Geography (Soil, Tree and Environmental Science), meditates upon; that the campus will soon be transformed into a nature-in-city exemplar of a garden with trees, shrubs and blooming flowers of variegated colours throughout the seasons.

“HK is excessively ‘concreted’. There needs to be a return to more greenery, paved areas need to be reverted to lawn or vegetated areas,” he said. But, this is a reflection of the fact that the city is a high-density metropolis and the general mentality that each and every inch of space should be utilised for maximum benefit is paramount.

But the Chair Professor also tells of student gripes about there being ‘no campus feel’ at HKU and that there are not enough green spaces. Only the Lily Pond, and some rather inaccessible slopes, constitutes green space, but over the years this limited oasis has been shrinking in size, while most of the slopes are too steep for any practical use.

One of Professor Jim’s first sustainability initiatives was the ‘green roof’, which he first tested in the middle of 2006 on the top of the Runme Shaw Building. He found that a 10 centimetre layer, consisting of waterproofing, drainage, water storage, soil and vegetation, could result in substantial reduction in maximum temperature by 18°C and suppression of daily temperature fluctuation to less than 4°C on a summer day.

Already, in Hong Kong, some new buildings are now being designed with green roofs in mind, while many older buildings can be retro-fitted.

“Rooftop greening has been commonly applied in such places as Europe, North America and Japan but is still relatively new to Hong Kong. Planting vegetation on a rooftop will not only reduce rooftop temperature significantly and help to conserve energy, it will also bring aesthetic and ecological benefits to the surroundings,” says Professor Jim.

His proposal to green the roof of the Library’s New Wing will soon be realised. The funding has already been secured and work will begin soon. Part of it will be accessible to students and staff and is likely to be covered with lawns, flowering shrubs and other attractive herbaceous vegetation.

The library is well-suited because of its lack of ‘clutter’, such as air conditioners, water tanks, piping and ducting, on the roof. Besides the multiple environmental benefits, it will bring economic dividends, not the least of which are heat insulation and cooling capability, resulting in lower internal ambient temperature which translates into lower energy costs. This is especially important in the case of the library because of its extended operating hours and notable electricity consumption for air-conditioning, he says.

He plans to monitor energy use levels before the start of construction and after the installation of the green roof to compare the difference. The added benefit is that the new green roof “will provide a ‘visual amenity’,” says the geography professor because a number of occupants of surrounding buildings will benefit from the soothing and delightful green vista.



One of the design-concepts already voiced by Professor Jim for the Centennial Campus is that of the seamless integration of ‘green and blue’. This is the combination of vegetation and water and how to marry the two harmoniously campus-wide so that it can be transformed into a blissful and serene garden ambience.

This he would like to see through the planting of many new, flowering plants and each blooming in a different season so that the campus always appears awash in colour. He also expects to see more green roofs and vertical greening.

In the courtyards of the Centennial Campus, he hopes to see more lawns, flowers and plants that give off a pleasing

fragrance. Other amenities Professor Jim would like to see incorporated are more ‘water features.’ Presently, only the Lily Pond, which has become a Hong Kong feature with its lotus and water lily plants, offers respite. But he would also like to see streams with running water stocked with fish, accompanied by fountains and emulated natural waterfalls.

Presently, the campus is already planted with flowering shrubs such as Azaleas, Camellias, Common Crape Myrtle, Ixora and Kwai-Fah.

“Despite the small campus area, we are endowed with an interesting array of ornamental trees planted mainly by the Lily Pond and around the Loke Yew Hall. They are represented by some notable specimens: African Tulip Tree, Camel’s Foot, Camphor Tree, Coral Tree, Chinese Banyan, Hong Kong Orchid Tree (*Bauhinia* ‘Blakeana’), Frangipani, Jacaranda, King Palm, Mock Peepul, Queen Crape Myrtle, Red Kapok, Spider Tree, Swamp Mahogany, Sweet Gum and Weeping Willow. Along University Drive, *Bauhinia* trees of different species have recently been planted”, says Professor Jim, but he hopes to see more Azaleas of different blossom colours being planted as well.

“We need to expand upon the concept of more nature thriving alongside culture. The campus design should take into consideration the relationship between it and nature,” he says. “A proper lawn and perhaps a real woodland area built atop the new reservoir area too.” ■

Centennial Campus

With its centenary approaching, HKU continues building history — with a bold new campus that combines the teaching and learning needs of the 21st Century with a respect for heritage, the environment and the local community.

There will be three new buildings which will house the Faculties of Social Sciences, Arts and Law. Additional facilities will include a new Lecture Hall with seating for more than 1,000 and a Learning Commons providing some 6,000 square metres of space for student academic activities. In addition, there will be a University Street, an open thoroughfare which links the existing campus with the Centennial Campus.



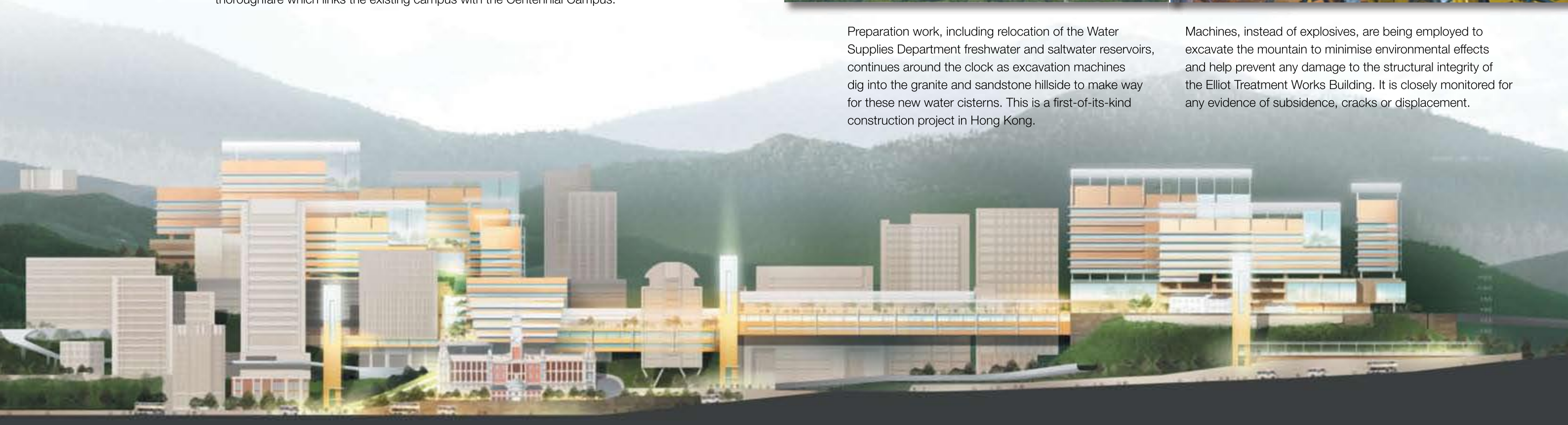
Bird's eye view of campus and Centennial Campus development

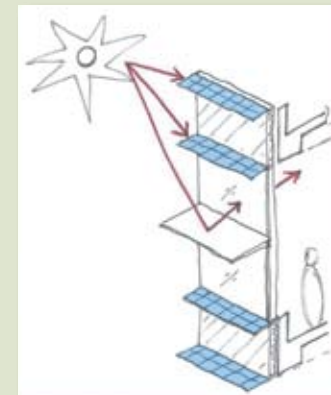

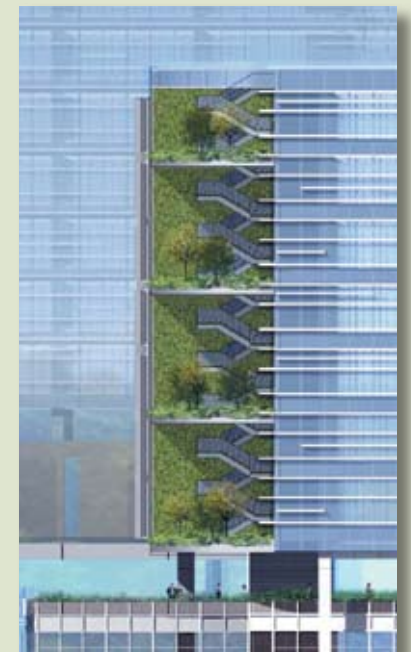

A Junk Shop Treasure

Engineering Society 1926

Professor Wang has been honoured in many countries. Three alumni were awarded the “Hong Kong Humanity Award” 香港人道年獎 co-organised by the Hong Kong Red Cross and Radio Television Hong Kong. This first-of-its-kind award pays tribute to those who live by and practise the spirit of humanity.

Professor Chan Ying-yang has been an active field medical volunteer for Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF), UNICEF, HelpAged International and Merlin over the past 10 years. In 2000, she was appointed president of MSF in Hong Kong and became the first Asian female and the youngest person assigned the role.



Dr Chow Pak-chin has been the “Honourable Ophthalmologist Ambassador” of “Sight First China Action” and the Vice-chairman of “Project Vision”. He is also the founding chairman of the Hong Kong Medical Association Charitable Foundation which aims to alleviate the suffering of the sick, the poor and the underprivileged.



Professor Lam Shun-chiu began his volunteer services with the Hong Kong Sports Association for the Physically Disabled. In 1991, he became the founding Honorary Director of the Kung Wah Lee Eye Tissue Laboratory, the first “active” Eye Bank in Hong Kong. He also founded the Project Vision Charitable Foundation in 2006 that aims to establish 100 charity eye centres in Mainland China.

Bill Mok Chin-man 莫展民 (BScEng 1985)

Dr Mok was invited by the Department of Civil Engineering to host a seminar called “Adaptive Reliability-Based Optimisation Model for Integrated Water Supply Operation Management” at his *alma mater* last December.

After working for Manusell Geotechnical Services for over a year, he studied at the University of California, Berkeley, where he obtained his MS and PhD degrees. He then joined Geomatrix Consultants in 1987 and is currently a principal engineer and hydrogeologist.

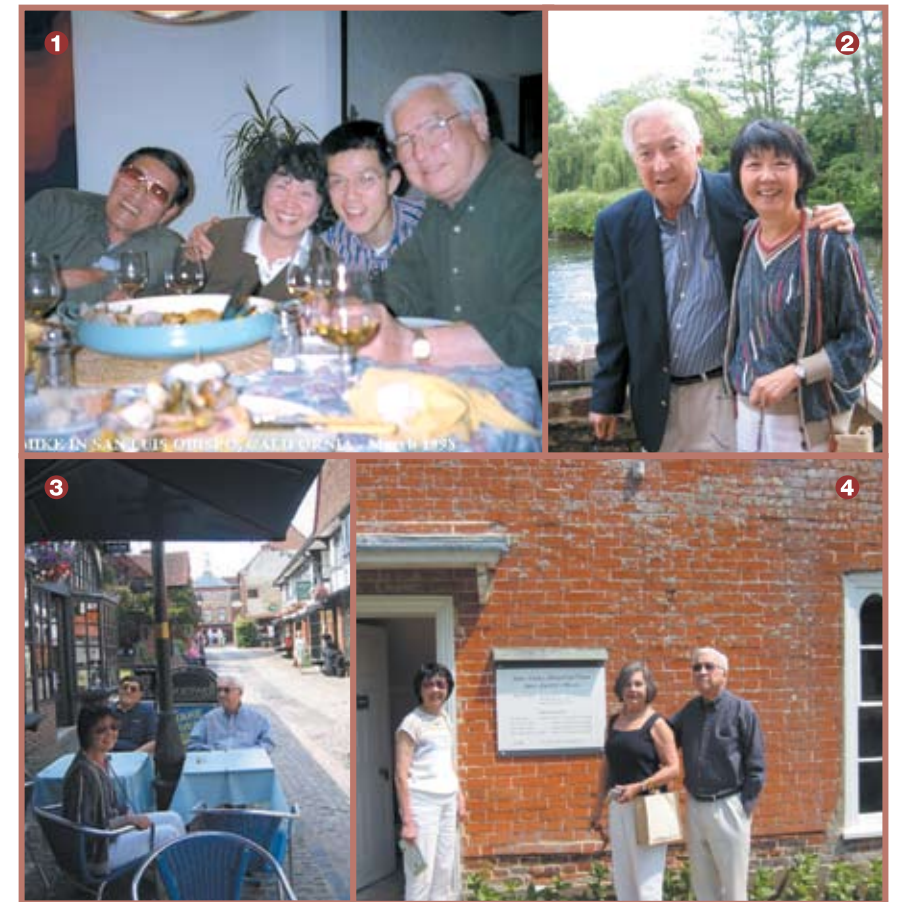
Eddy Khoe 丘建漳 (BArch 1955)

Unlike their predecessors, many Tibetans in modern Lhasa will hail a bus, a van or even a taxi to save time and energy, rather than attempt a 30-minute walk. During peak hours, a 16-seat bus can be crammed with as many as 60 people!"

Wong Siu-kit
黃兆傑**

(BA 1960; MA 1965)

Professor S K Wong, Honorary Professor of the School of Chinese, passed away on November 7, 2007, at the age of 70.

Professor Wong was regarded as a distinguished translator of Classical Chinese, and the most eloquent interpreter of Chinese culture in the English tongue. His *Early Chinese Literary Criticism* is still widely read, even more than 20 years after its first publication.

Professor Wong taught at HKU since 1967 and retired in 2003. Throughout his thirty-six years of teaching, he successfully inspired generations of young minds. A highly revered scholar of great creativity and integrity, Professor Wong will be sorely missed by many of his students and friends.

Professor Lo Chor-pang, a distinguished geography alumnus, passed away on December 30, 2007, at the age of 68.

Professor Lo was Professor of Geography at the University of Georgia, where he had worked since March 1984. After he obtained his Bachelor (First Class Honours) and Masters degrees, he went on to study for his PhD degree at the University of Glasgow, United Kingdom, in 1971.

He was a former Reader in Geography at HKU. Professor Lo's teaching and research interests included photogrammetry, remote sensing, geographic information systems, and geography of China, on which he had published seven books and well over 100 papers. He was the recipient of the William A. Owens Award on Creative Research, the Outstanding Research Medal in Geographic Remote Sensing, and the Lifetime Research Award and Lifetime Achievement Award.

HKU Foundation Stone

The press started it, one can say. On December 15, 1905, the China Mail editorial argued that Hong Kong should set up a university to cater for the demand for higher education from all over China. The article aroused discussion in the press but the Governor, Matthew Nathan, dismissed the notion of a local university, saying that funding for it would be difficult.

Following the change of the Governor to Frederick D Lugard in July 1907, China Mail renewed its argument for a local university. Lugard found the idea interesting and toyed with it. At a prize-giving ceremony at St Stephen's College in January 1908, he said that Hong Kong should be "the Oxford and Cambridge of the Far East", suggesting a university to serve Hong Kong as well as Mainland China. Lugard was challenged to act on his ideals when, just days later, Hormusjee Mody, a successful businessman who had been in Hong Kong for over 50 years, pledged \$150,000 to the construction cost and \$30,000 to the endowment fund for a university in Hong Kong.

Lugard took up the challenge with zest. He managed to persuade the College of Medicine to change its expansion plan to that of incorporation into the proposed university and commissioned an extensive fund raising drive in Hong Kong and Mainland China. A "Chinese Fund-Raising Sub-Committee" was formed under the chairmanship of Ho Kai, one of the founders of the College of Medicine, and this committee was instrumental to obtaining public support to the notion of a university in Hong Kong for principally Chinese students. Lugard also managed to secure official support from Mainland China. Apart from personal charm and reasons, he achieved this by repeatedly assuring that the proposed university would be free from politics – not antagonistic to the Qing Dynasty anyway. In the event, half of the initial endowment fund was subscribed to by Chinese donors.

Having secured sufficient donations for the initial endowment fund, a ceremony was held in the afternoon of March 16, 1910 at the site of the proposed university at the junction of Bonham Road and Pokfulam Road. To the 1,300 people gathered under two large tents there, Mody opened the ceremony by explaining what was behind his generous donation:

"It was with the idea of in some measure providing for others what I was myself denied."

To enable the project to proceed in the best design, he had increased his donation for the university's construction cost to \$285,000, a remarkable sum even for an extremely wealthy man like him.

Speaking after Mody, Lugard set out his vision of the university:

"It is my belief that the graduates of this University, its doctors of medicine, its scientific engineers, and its trained administrators, will exert an influence which will be unmeasurable in the future, among the 400 millions of China's population. ... Not, I trust, with distorted conceptions and theories of government antagonistic to the established order of their country, but imbued with that genuine patriotism whose only aim is to make their country better and greater, and to share with others the benefits they have themselves received."

Then he gave Mody a pleasant surprise by announcing that the King had just appointed Mody a Knight Bachelor.

For more than once, Mody had declared the wish to see the opening of the university soon. Perhaps this was why he readily agreed to increase his donation for the construction cost. However, he never lived to see the University's opening day. He passed away in June 1910.

On the left wall in the north Ground Floor lobby of Loke Yew Hall is framed the Foundation Stone. With reference to one of the available copies of photographs of the ceremony on March 16, 1910, the framed stone is clearly smaller than the one used at the ceremony by 20 cm or so. The University Archives at HKU have documents showing that the framed stone had been there since the University opened but the wooden surrounds had to be replaced after WWII. One wonders if the stone block used in the ceremony somehow went missing or was damaged beyond repair so that a replacement had to be made when the University opened in 1912.

By the way, the same HKU Archives records also show that the main doors to the lobby also date back to 1912, having somehow survived the lootings during WWII.

Next time when you visit Loke Yew Hall, look at the Foundation Stone. It's the marker of HKU's conception. And don't forget the great doors while you're at it. ■

Election of Members to the Standing Committee

Nominations are hereby invited for the election of eight members to the Standing Committee at the coming Ordinary General Meeting 2008 on June 26, 2008. Each elected member will serve on the Standing Committee for a term of three years until the Ordinary General Meeting in 2011.

According to Paragraphs 26 and 28 of the Convocation Constitution, a person is eligible to be nominated for the election if he/she has been a member of Convocation for two years, and a retiring member is eligible for re-election. Paragraph 25(b) of the Convocation Constitution prohibits the Standing Committee from having more than four members who are also officers, teachers or staff of the University or who are also in receipt of any salary or stipend therefrom, excepting individuals occasionally appointed to ad hoc professional contracts. Of the current Standing Committee members whose terms of office will continue beyond the coming Ordinary General Meeting, three are in receipt of salaries from the University under employment contracts. Accordingly, at the coming Ordinary General Meeting, no more than one member within the definition of paragraph 25(b) may be elected.

Nomination Procedures

Paragraph 40 of the Convocation Rules requires that each candidate must be nominated in writing by at least ten members entitled to vote.

Nomination form can be downloaded from <http://www.hku.hk/convocat/election/2008> or obtained from the Secretariat, c/o Development & Alumni Affairs Office, The University of Hong Kong (Tel: 2859 2603). All nominations shall be accompanied by a statement by the candidate that he/she is willing to stand for election.

Each candidate is requested to attach with the nominations a brief biography of himself/herself, in English, of not more than 200 words and a copy of his/her photograph for publication to members.

Nominations should reach the Clerk of Convocation, c/o Development & Alumni Affairs Office, 738, 7/F, Knowles Building, The University of Hong Kong before 5 pm, Monday, May 5, 2008. Fax is not a valid mode of delivery of nominations to the Clerk.

Validity of Nomination Forms

All nomination forms shall be clearly completed with the required information and bear the original signature of the nominators.

Ordinary General Meeting Notice and Election Information

Under Paragraphs 4 and 5 of the Convocation Rules, the notice of the Ordinary General Meeting and election information may be sent to members by electronic mail or by an advertisement placed in an English and a Chinese language newspaper authorised by the Government to carry official or legal advertisements in Hong Kong at least twenty-one days before the Ordinary General Meeting. Members wishing to have prints of the notice and election information are welcome to contact the Secretariat.
